Friends Award Our First-Ever Literacy Grants to Local Non-Profits

The Friends of the Reston Regional Library (FRRL) recently announced the awarding of one-time grants **to four local organizations that support and promote literacy in the community.**

These grants are intended to strengthen literacy education in our community by narrowing the gap between learners' needs and organizations' financial resources. Ranging from \$11,000 to \$30,000, the grants will be given to support hands-on programming that directly impacts literacy.

FRRL Board President Brian Jacoby said, "We have been so impressed by the work these organizations are carrying out. The proposed programs, both long-established and new, will bring much needed literacy support to participants. The results will last a lifetime. We're honored and privileged to be able to be a part of it."

All Ages Read Together – Helping children to be "kindergarten ready," with free preschool for children and families in under-resourced communities.

For Success In Kindergarten and Beyond All Ages Read Together (AART) is a 501(c)(3) dedicated to educating children in need with free preschool programs in their communities. They strive to address the preschool opportunity gap for many working families throughout Fairfax County and Northern Virginia. AART preschool classes are designed to build and strengthen preschool-aged children's fundamental skills in early literacy, English language development, math skills, and socialization in the classroom setting. All AART classes take place in in-kind donated spaces like Northern Virginia county libraries, affordable housing communities, and senior centers. During the school year, classes meet twice a week for 30 weeks, for 60 sessions and at least 90 hours of direct instruction.

Each class is led by experienced Preschool Teachers and supported by a bilingual Preschool Assistant and volunteers. There is at least one book used each week to introduce or strengthen one or two essential skills kindergarteners will need. To promote the development of these skills, teachers use a standard class schedule that includes fun learning activities and centers. At the end of the week, the student will take home a copy of the book and a parent resource sheet to practice learning at home.

EEC provides English language and literacy instruction to those who cannot read, write, speak, or understand English beyond the 6th grade level, through a model that combines intensive instruction with support services. EEC uses today's best practices for adult learning and second language acquisition in its instruction. Classes are available at a variety of locations, times and duration throughout Northern Virginia. With English skills, EEC learners can gain a foothold in the workforce, obtain job advancement, or move on to higher level learning.

This FRRL grant will help fund a Family Learning Program in Reston and an adult Beginning English program in Herndon. The Family Learning Program emphasizes the needs of parents with school-aged children, engaging families in activities that help parents develop their English and reinforce what their children are learning in school. Classroom-based programs like the Beginning English course provide instruction in the context of both workplace and life-skills.



The **Loudoun Literacy Council:** Early Intervention Family Literacy programming for at-risk preschoolers.

Loudoun Literacy Council's Early Intervention Family Literacy Program for STEP Preschoolers was initiated in 2017 to provide family literacy services to 320 at-risk children and their families enrolled in Loudoun County Public School's (LCPS) STEP (Starting Towards Excellence in Preschool) Program. The STEP classrooms are located throughout the county and all students served are from low-income families. Loudoun Literacy Council provides cognitive learning opportunities and activities to enhance the early language, literacy, and prereading development of preschool age children, particularly those from low-income families. They also provide free books and materials for children to take home to build their own home libraries.

By providing new books and at-home literacy activities for STEP families, LLC enables parents to become their child's first and most important teacher. Family Literacy Nights are geared to provide language and literature-rich environments, so that the children can attain the fundamental knowledge and skills necessary for optimal reading development in kindergarten and beyond. By modeling reading aloud, and demonstrating how learning can be a fun and interactive experience, LLC provides parents with important tools for at-home learning.



Literacy Volunteers of America – Prince William County: Helping people take charge of their families' healthcare through the development and execution of a health literacy program for English Language Learners.

LVA-PW was founded by Dona Swanson, a former public librarian in Prince William County, VA, more than 30 years ago. They provide conversation classes, more advanced English learning classes, and Citizenship classes.

Financial support from the Friends of the Reston Regional Library will help fund the B4HealthLiteracy 2023 program, the most recent addition to LVA-PW's curriculum. These classes in Health Literacy have been created to specifically address the complexity of healthcare-related language. LVA-PW has embraced health literacy for many reasons; most driven by the dire impact low health literacy has on millions of people globally, including thousands of people in our own backyard. B4Health Literacy education will especially reach out to support minorities and seniors, the groups most affected by the financial burdens caused by low health literacy.

Library News

At the recent Fairfax County budget hearings, the Library Board of Trustees and the Fairfax Library Foundation made a public appeal to the County Board of Supervisors to increase the FCPL collections budget. Best library practices and the Library Board's own policy recommends that the collections budget totals <u>at least</u> 20% of the library's total budget. The current proposed collections budget is around 10%, or less than half of what would be a minimum needed to maintain a sufficient collection for the population of Fairfax County. *The proposed budget provides no new funding for books* (physical or digital). As most of you will remember, FRRL recently donated \$200,000 of our own funds to help with this major need, but of course this only scratches the surface of a countywide challenge.

The Library Board of Trustees Chair, Brian Engler, and Fairfax Library Foundation Board Chair, Miriam Smolen, each touched on the amazing contributions of FCPL staff, how critical library services are to the community, and unfortunately how underfunded the library's collections budget remains. Ardent library users are well acquainted with long wait lines for many titles, the need to update and expand nonfiction collections, and the sad faces when children (and adults!) visit and cannot find their favorite new series on the shelves.

Over the last several months, the Library Board of Trustees has been developing a Friends and Advocates Network, or a FAN club, to connect and inspire library supporters in times of need. The committee is asking everyone to help them spread the word about this urgent need for collections improvement. If you missed the budget hearings but still want to make sure your voice is heard, please consider writing an email to your local elected official, urging them to increase the library's book budget (see links below). The Trustees encourage everyone to include your own stories about the library's collection and your experiences with the library. If you'd like a help drafting a letter to your elected officials, the Trustees committee is available to help. 
